Briefly explain how middle childhood and adolescence compare to one another.

Suggested answer: Sample response: In middle childhood, children improve their thinking and memory and start building stronger friendships. In adolescence, they go through puberty and begin to think more deeply and abstractly. Friendships become even more important, and they start to focus more on becoming independent and figuring out who they are. Both stages involve growing socially, but adolescence adds big physical and emotional changes.

Suggested answer: Sample response: A drawback to naturalistic observation is participant reactivity. This phenomena means that the participants will not act naturally or the way that they would typically act in the researcher's presence.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Consequences play a large role in both operant conditioning and social cognitive theory. A main difference is that social cognitive theory through observational learning incorporates thought processes and the observation of the consequences of a behavior in deciding whether or not to imitate the behavior.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Ethology and evolutionary developmental theory both explain development using ideas from evolution. Ethology focuses on inborn behaviors, like a baby crying or smiling to get a caregiver's attention, which help ensure survival. Evolutionary developmental theory also looks at survival, but it adds that development happens through constant interaction between genes and the environment. In contrast, bioecological systems theory focuses less on biology and more on how a child grows through layers of their environment, like home, school, and culture. All three theories agree that context matters, but they differ in how much importance they place on biology, behavior, or environmental systems.

Q105. [Essay]

Describe the difference between continuous and discontinuous developmental changes and give an example of each.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Continuous development is gradual and steady, like children slowly improving problem-solving skills. Discontinuous development happens in sudden stages, such as the vocabulary “burst” infants experience or the rapid body changes during puberty.

Q106. [Essay]

A psychology class has put together an experimental research design to test for attention to a task. Group 1 is listening to music while putting together a puzzle. Group 2 has a TV on in the background while putting together a puzzle. Group 3 is in a silent room putting together a puzzle. The class observes and measures how long it takes each participant in each group to put together the puzzle. List the parts to this experiment, including the variables and groups.

Suggested answer: Sample response: The dependent variable would be the time it takes to put together the puzzle as it is being measured. The independent variables are both the noise and the TV. Groups 1 and 2 are experimental groups while Group 3 is the control.

Q107. [Essay]

Scientists design a study to test separation anxiety in preschoolers. They decide, after obtaining informed consent from the parents, to also ask each child if they can talk to them before they interview them. Identify what the scientists are engaging in and why.

Suggested answer: Sample response: The scientists are engaging in child assent. This is part of the informed consent process. Since minors are too young to give informed consent but old enough to understand their participation in a study like this one, child assent has been developed to give children their own choice to participate.

Q108. [Essay]

Four-year-old Freya does not want to share her toys during free time at preschool. She cries, screams, and sometimes hits other children. The teacher has explained sharing, but Freya is not responding. Describe what a psychoanalytic theorist and a behaviorist theorist would say to explain and/or to remedy the situation.

Suggested answer: Sample response: A psychoanalytic theorist would say Freya's behavior may come from inner emotional needs or past experiences that are hard for her to express and suggest providing consistent support in a safe environment to manage the exhibited high emotions and behaviors. A behaviorist would focus on how her actions are being rewarded or punished and suggest using consistent consequences to shape her behavior, like praising her for sharing or taking toys away when she hits.

Q109. [Essay]

Provide a detailed description of how you could use operant conditioning to increase the number of times your roommate washes the dishes instead of leaving them dirty in the sink.

Suggested answer: *Sample response: To use operant conditioning to get my roommate to wash the dishes more often, I would use positive reinforcement. Each time they wash the dishes, I could thank them or do something nice in return, like offering to make coffee or share a snack. This pleasant outcome would make it more likely they repeat the behavior. If they leave dishes in the sink, I could remove a benefit, like not inviting them to share dinner, which would be a form of punishment. Over time, the positive response to clean dishes should increase the chances of them doing the dishes more often.*

Q110. [Essay]

Explain the ethical responsibilities of developmental scientists when working with children and families.

Suggested answer: *Sample response: Developmental scientists must protect children and families by avoiding harm, being honest, and clearly explaining their role. They must follow rules that keep participants safe and treat them fairly. Since children can't give legal consent, parents provide permission, and researchers ask children for their agreement, called assent. As children grow, researchers should give more details and involve them more in decisions. Respecting families' rights and being clear, fair, and caring are key parts of doing ethical research.*
