Members, affiliate members, and associate members span the spectrum from students to doctoral-level psychologists; they come from a variety of places including educational settings, criminal justice, hospitals, the armed forces, and industry.

Sample Answer: While structuralism focused on understanding the conscious experience, functionalism focused on how mental activities helped an organism adapt to its environment. Wilhelm Wundt, a structuralist theorist, believed that our cognitive experience was best understood by breaking that experience into its component parts using introspection. William James was a functionalist: Functionalism focused on how mental activities served as adaptive responses to an organism's environment. Like Wundt, James also relied on introspection; however, James's research approach also incorporated more objective measures.
